At the request of the TTB I am proposing a new name for the proposed Willow Creek Idaho AVA. The new name will be "Eagle Foothills" as this name more properly identifies the region of Idaho described in the original petition. It will also eliminate any confusion with the "Willow Creek" AVA in northern California and the soon to be named "Paso Robles Willow Creek District."

The Eagle Foothills area is located within the existing Snake River Valley AVA and adjacent to its northeastern margin, approximately 10 miles northwest of Boise, ID.

Listed below are 12 sources that refer to the Eagle Foothills in both local and national publications, both current and historic. The Eagle Foothills are mentioned both as a geographic area, and as a qualitative aspect. Links to each source via the complete URL are below.





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2011 Idaho Winery to Watch: 3 Horse Ranch Vineyards

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EAGLE, Idaho — Greg Cunningham made his nest egg as a marketing whiz, and he also seems to be a rather quick study when it comes to growing grapes in the Snake River Valley.

He'll be the first to admit, however, the smartest move he's made as owner of 3 Horse Ranch Vineyards in Eagle, Idaho, was hiring Greg Koenig.

"A good winemaker isn't defined by one good wine that might have come during a great vintage," Cunningham said. "Greg has made good wines in Idaho for close to 20 years."

That partnership shows in the bottles from the Idaho's largest organic vineyard for the state's third-largest winery. Those factors, combined with Cunningham's drive to elevate the perception of Gem State wines, led to

3 Horse Ranch Vineyard being named as Wine Press Northwest's 2011 Idaho Winery to Watch.

In less than five years, 3 Horse Ranch became the state's largest family-owned winery. Their first vintage, 2006, produced fewer than 1,000 cases. That allowed the Cunninghams to open in 2008. By 2010, despite a cool season, production jumped to 7,000 cases.

"Normally, we'd have a dozen days of 100-degree temperatures," Cunningham said. "One year, there were 23 days in a row. Last year, we had just one 100-degree day."

The target for 2011 is to produce 10,000 cases, and he'll continue to purchase Riesling and additional varieties from other Idaho vineyards. It explains why Cunningham plans to build a production facility on the ranch for Koenig, who lives 40 miles to the southwest and makes wine for three wineries - including his own Koenig Vineyards.

Cunningham said he's increasing production to meet demand and maintain shelf space year-round. One key is training his staff to work with distributors, but he's also hand-selling bottles throughout Idaho, pouring at places such as the Fred Meyer in Coeur d'Alene.

Curious shoppers leave as educated buyers because they enjoy the wine, embrace the organic concept and want to support Idaho industry, Cunningham said. He's also opened markets in Washington, Montana and Wyoming, and he'd like his colleagues to follow. But perhaps every Idaho winery should revisit its marketing approach to its own state.

"Between 70 and 80 percent of the wine sold in Idaho is made in California," Cunningham said. "We need to have the consumer in Idaho trust our products. And the growth of Idaho's wine industry depends on people planting great vineyards. When you have to go out of state to buy grapes, you rarely get the best fruit."

Idaho long has been known for Riesling and off-dry reds, yet the Snake River Valley's future may be best linked to Rhone varieties. It's no coincidence that Wine Press Northwest has awarded its top rating of "Outstanding!" to a pair of 3 Horse Ranch Vineyards wines - the 2008 Estate Viognier and the 2008 Reserve Syrah.

Just before that harvest, the vineyard that sits at 2,800 feet elevation was certified as organic.

There's room to grow, too. Of the 500 acres deemed suitable for wine grapes, fewer than 40 have been planted.

"When we moved to the ranch, there were three of us - our daughter, Gary and myself - and three horses," said wife, Martha. "That was in 1998. And we still have three horses."


Cunningham left Sacramento, Calif., after a successful career in the world of corporate business travel. He and Martha lived eight years in McCall before buying 1,600 acres in the Eagle Foothills on a dirt road that's not so lonely anymore. They began planting vines in 2003.

"I used to play golf five days a week and got down to 2-handicap, but you can't play that game and own a vineyard," he said. "I miss the game, but I love the vineyard more. I don't think I played more than six rounds in 2010."

This year, one of his top priorities is working with Koenig to extend their long-term relationship.

"My life is no longer about age. It's about vintages," said Cunningham, 61. "I want to live long enough to see where this goes."

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Northwest Foothills Transportation Study - Update

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General Description

Commission Delays Adoption of the Northwest Foothills Transportation Study Update

The Ada County Highway District put off a decision on the future expansion of Beacon Light Road until early 2015, based largely on a request from the City of Eagle, which pledged to seek ways to decrease growth in the city and in the foothills.

ACHD Commissioners welcomed the city's request but cautioned that unless thousands of new homes and tens of thousands of new residents disappear from already-approved plans for developments and subdivisions, the road expansion is likely inevitable. The decision pleased the crowd of nearly 200 people that turned out on January 22, 2014 and packed the ACHD auditorium to capacity.

In the interim, Commissioners said ACHD will continue to acquire rightof-way along Beacon Light with each development proposal; conversely, if no new proposals come in, no new land for an expanded road will be purchased. Commissioners urged the crowd to work with Eagle to decrease the amount of planned growth in and around the Eagle

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Foothills and to work with the Idaho Transportation Department to secure funding to expand State Highways 44 and 16, as well as US. 20/26 (Chinden Boulevard).

The proposal to expand Beacon Light Road in 2035 is part of the larger Northwest Foothills Transportation Plan, which is being updated from the version approved in 2008. A portion of the draft plan calls for a five-lane Beacon Light road from Idaho 55 to Idaho 16, based on traffic expected in the next 20 years.

Today, the road has about 200 vehicle trips in the peak hour. By 2035, that number is expected to jump by 1,500 trips an hour.

Many of the opponents of the road expansion suggested that the state highway system be expanded to serve the future traffic demand, calling for the expansion of SH 44 and Chinden to six lanes and the connection of SH 16 to Interstate 84. The estimated cost for that work is \$1 billion – an amount the state says it does not have and is unlikely to get in the near future.

Wildfire in Eagle foothills 100% contained after destroying three homes

BOISE -- A wildfire burningin the Eagle foothills Wednesday afternoon destroyed three homes and a barn, and forced the evacuation of hundred of homes.

As of 10 p.m., fire officials report the fire was 100 percentcontained.

Officials say no one was injured but, the blaze destroyedstructures are in the area of Homer and Smoky Ridge, and Homer and Skyline Drive.

A storm moving through the valley earlier in the day sparked a grass fire east of Highway 16 near Linder and Homer roads.

The latest estimate is that 4,857 acres have been charred, down from an earlier estimate of 6,000 acres. The firemoved east across the foothills toward Highway 55. Most residents in the blackened areaswere not being allowed back in their homes as fire crews continued to douse hot spots.

The winds picked up againWednesday afternoon and fire officials say additional homes northeast of Homer Roadand Ballantyne, stretching east to Quarter Drive were threatened by the flames.

Ada County Sheriff's deputies and Eagle Police officersevacuated homes in the area. A call also went out on a geocast, a type of reverse 911 that warns residents about dangers such as this.

Residentswere told to go to Eagle High School at 574 N. Park Lane. The Red Crossset up a shelter at the high school and provided cots, blankets, water and food.

Boise Fire spokeswoman Lynn Hightowersaid that all homes north of Valli High east to Willow Creekwere being evacuated.

This wildfire continued to pose problems for firefighters throughout the afternoon because of the winds. Also, getting enough water to fight the firewas an issue.

Therewere 300 firefighters from the Bureau of Land Management, Idaho Department of Lands, Eagle, Star, Meridian, Boise and Caldwell fire departments battling the wildfire. A callwent out for additional firefighting help. Crewsmade a heavy aerial assault with helicopter water bucket drops and retardant drops from air tankers.

The BLMhad five air tankers, two helicopters, 12 engines and two Hot Shot crews - one from Boise and one from Vale, Oregon - working the fire. A Hot Shot crew is made up of 21 members that are specially trained incutting fire lines quickly. Threebulldozers were used to cut fire lines.

About three homes were threatened earlier in the afternoon, but crews worked quickly and were about to get fire lines around those residences. Crews from above made water and retardant drops.

We've all known that this is just a tinder box ready to go. And of course, living in the foothills you always worry about this, said homeowner Carol Telford.

Telford was shopping in Eagle when she learned that flames were creeping toward her home. She says a few years ago another grass fire came close to her house.

Katie Ingram lives in that area and said she saw some horses running down the road, but was able to corral them. She was worried when she first spotted the fast-moving fire, but expressed relief that flames did not claim any homes.

Boise Fire Chief Dennis Doan says their top priority is keeping people safe and structure protection.

The firecrested the rim around 3:30 p.m. and firefighters were moved to safer ground. There have been no injuries to report.

Initially it was reported there was another fire near the Avimor subdivision along Highway 55 north of Boise, but authorities say that is not the case. It was http://www.ktvb.com/story/local/2014/07/16/11528375/

Investigators believe lightning caused the fire, since thunderstormsmoved through the areaWednesday morning.

A red flag warning remains in effect for much of southwest Idaho.

A red flag warning means that the current conditions could mean severe fire danger.

Abundant lightning and dry fuels is the reason for the warning.

CALDWELL, Idaho - Riesling and white Rhône varieties thrive in the high-elevation, long-season viticulture of Idaho's Snake River Valley, but two of the state's largest wineries have proven Pinot Gris can succeed at 2,800 feet.

And this spring, 3 Horse Ranch Vineyards in the Eagle Foothills north of Boise won a gold medal at the Northwest Wine Summit for its 2012 Estate Pinot Gris.

"I think it would be interesting to see Pinot Gris planted in some more sites to see how it would do because the few versions that I've seen from Idaho are actually quite good, but it certainly doesn't get as much attention as Riesling and Chardonnay and Viognier," said Greg Koenig, who makes the wine for 3 Horse Ranch owner Gary Cunningham. "Pinot Gris is way down the list in terms of acres planted. I think it would be a great grape for this region, even though it's a long growing region."

Champions for the Burgundy variety include Kathryn House, former assistant winemaker at Betz Family Winery in Woodinville, Wash., and now a winemaking and viticulture consultant in Boise

Over the next several months, I'll be hitting the trail to report on the best outdoor adventure spots in the great state of Idaho. These reports will hopefully provide unique insight into the lifestyle and history of some of the most scenic parts of the Gem State, while shedding light on the fun to be had for weekend warriors willing to go a little further off the beaten path.



Many of the sites I'll be visiting are listed as part of the <u>Idaho Adventure Motorcycle Club's 2011 Challenge (http://www.motoidaho.com/</u>). Appropriately, all reports will be done atop my old trusted friend, the War Pig—a Honda XL600V Transalp dual-sport motorcycle.

Site No. 1: Pearl

To tell the truth, Pearl, Idaho, doesn't really exist anymore—at least not as it once did. The old mining town is little more than a few historical relics and ranches left over since its heyday in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Despite this unfortunate fate, Pearl is still a wonderful place to explore, and just a stone's throw from Boise.

Leaving Boise around 2 p.m., I navigated the sea of greater Eagle's McMansions until I was noticeably north of the homogeneous city landscape. Eagle Road turns into Pearl/Willow Creek Road about a mile north of Beacon Light Road. A few tight and twisty curves later, the pavement transitions to a well-manicured dirt road where the fun begins.

There are numerous forks and splits in Pearl Road along the way. I suggest keeping to the right (northeast) to end up on Highway 55 at the summit of Horseshoe Bend Hill. Alternate routes can take you west to Highway 16. Much of the land in this area is privately owned, so be sure to stay off the surrounding ranch properties.

As you enter Pearl, you may begin to envision what it looked like 100-plus years ago. Old abandoned mine shafts, a few archaic building foundations and some excavation sites are all that remain, but still provide enough imagination fodder to visualize a bustling—albeit short-lived—boom town. The main mine abutting Pearl Road is photo-worthy, complete with an ancient rusted-out sedan half buried in the hillside above the entrance.



A few miles north of the original Pearl townsite, you begin to see signage stating: "Road not maintained in inclement weather." While the road out of Pearl can be rough, the hilltop panoramas are unbeatable. The 5-mile traverse back to Highway 55 is peppered with endless vistas overlooking the Treasure Valley and Eagle Foothills. Apart from a few ranchers and the occasional dirt bike or ATV, I only came across a handful of people on a Sunday afternoon. I rolled back into Boise by way of Cartwright Road around 4 p.m.

The road to Pearl is certainly one of the best short trips in Southern Idaho, one where you can't help but feel a sense of nostalgia for what Idaho used to be.

Total roundtrip from Boise: 25-51 miles
